### Dain Anderson: Lead Developer



Dain Anderson became Terra Dotta's first employee

in January 2003, joining founders Brandon S. Lee and Garrett Christian. He is currently the lead software developer at Terra Dotta, but being a leader is nothing new for Dain.

In the late 90's, Dain became a board member of the HTML Writer's Guild and has served as co-author and technical editor for several books on ColdFusion and SQL programming. Dain's code is used and cited in over 50 books, trade journals and open-source

projects.

Outside of Terra Dotta, Dain spends time with his wife Nancy, his daughter Jarah, and his son Eli. He also runs a network of websites dedicated to retro gaming systems including NintendoAge.com and SegaAge.com, the former of which gets over three million hits per month and is considered the go-to site for Nintendo game collecting. Dain served as an executive producer for the documentary "Ecstasy of Order: The Tetris Masters,†about the greatest Tetris players in the world.

Dain was a study abroad student in Russia in 1991 and hopes to visit the famous Moai stone faces on Easter Island someday.
